

Almost thirty years ago **David Burrow** joined the ICTM Board as a regional director for what was then AEA 3. He has continued on the Board, serving in a wide range of positions. David created the original ICTM website and served as webmaster for many years. In recent years his primary duty has been newsletter editor. David co-authored an article on using mnemonic devices for the *ICTM Journal*, and also assists at ICTM conferences, and has spoken at past conferences.

Burrow joined ICTM as a student at University of Northern Iowa, earning Bachelor of Arts. Later he earned a Master of Education degree from the University of Southern Mississippi. He was originally hired to teach Spanish (his college minor). David offers, "I have always thought there are many close similarities between learning a foreign language and learning math."

Since 1983, David has taught mathematics and served as Coordinator for Gifted & Talented students at Bishop Garrigan High School, Algona. David remains certified in secondary mathematics, and Spanish, and K-12 gifted and talented education. Currently he is the math department head, and teaches Geometry, Advanced Algebra/Trigonometry, Analysis, Discrete Math, Calculus, Statistics, and a web design class. He notes, "I have worked at Bishop Garrigan throughout my adult life."

"Ever since I was in high school myself, people have told me I have a knack for explaining math and helping people understand it. My favorite part of the job is doing just that. I love seeing kids who struggle suddenly see how things fit together and even develop a love for math."

Burrow's extra-curricular duties include speech, quiz bowl, the math team, and broadcasting. His academic teams have been to nationals seventeen times, and several of his speech students have earned all-state honors. He serves on a number of school committees, and also serves as the P.A. announcer for football and baseball games. Burrow comments, "I enjoy baseball and particularly liked following one of

my former students on his journey to the Major Leagues."

Burrow's teaching expanded into Iowa Lakes Community College (ILCC), where he has been an Adjunct Instructor in Mathematics since1993, teaching mostly in a distance education (television) setting. He currently teaches Statistics, and has also taught Math for Liberal Arts, Math for Medical Professionals, College Algebra, and Calculus I. In addition, Burrow has served on several college committees, and in 1999 he co-authored the best practices book *Teaching on Television* with five other ILCC faculty distance education instructors.

Burrow's work has been recognized with several awards:

- Finalist, Iowa Techer of the Year (Iowa Department of Education)
- Excellence in Education Award (Catholic Diocese of Sioux City)
- Outstanding Educator Award (Kossuth County Jaycees).

Burrow is very proud of the many successful students he has taught, and is thrilled that several of his former students have gone on to become math teachers themselves.
